

## SUMMARY

**Subject of the thesis:** The current stage of Canadian-Russian relations

**Topicality of the research issue:** After the collapse of the Soviet Union, modern international relations are confronted with realities that testify to a new alignment of forces on a global scale, about the changing role of most countries in the life of the world community. The study of these processes has great scientific and practical significance.

Canada, whose foreign policy is devoted to the Russian Federation, is one of the most developed and influential countries in the world, with the largest production base and high scientific and technical potential.

In this regard, the relevance of the work is conditioned, first, by the need to study the changes taking place in a globalizing world deeply, scientifically.

The second aspect of relevance relates to the participation of national states in the formation of a new world order. The Canadian influence on the political, economic and cultural processes in the world is significant. After the Cold War, Canada's foreign policy has undergone significant changes: the approaches to the architectonics of international relations and assessing its role in the world are being updated, and the range of foreign policy priorities is expanding.

The third aspect, which determines the relevance of the topic of work, is determined by the interests of Russia. Constructive relations with Canada are necessary for ensuring national security and strengthening, Russia's positions on the world stage, as well as solving the tasks of our economic, social and cultural development.

Canada, for its part, is interested in relations with Russia as a great Eurasian power, a potentially profitable partner. The partnership between the two countries and one of the important factors in the creation of a new world order.

**The purpose** An analysis of The current stage of Canadian-Russian relations.

**Research objectives:**

- Identify the methodology for the study of the foreign policy of the state;
- determine the basis for the formation and implementation of the foreign policy of modern states;
- formulate the main directions of Canada's foreign policy;
- give a description of the current stage of Canadian-Russian relations;
- Analyze the prospects of bilateral cooperation between Canada and Russia.

**Scientific novelty:**

The scientific novelty of the study is determined by the complex nature of the study, attempts to generalize the complex processes occurring in the world through the prism of analysis of Canada's foreign policy. In the context of this work, an attempt was made to analyze Canada's current foreign policy towards Russia, identifying key features of its implementation and identifying the main promising areas for bilateral cooperation.

**Structure:** the two chapters, containing two paragraphs each, the conclusion and an 90-reference bibliography (48 of which are in foreign languages) and the appendixes. The total volume is 83 pages.

**Summary:** The main and unconditional foreign policy priorities of any government of Canada will remain the development of relations with the United States. However, relations with other countries are also growing: in the Asia-Pacific region, in the Middle and Middle East and in Latin America. Also at the present stage there is quite a high activity in relation to Ottawa and Moscow.

In conclusion, there is every reason to note the coincidence of the long-term, strategic foreign policy attitudes of our two countries with respect to the most significant global problems. In particular, being committed to multilateral approaches to ensuring a democratic, just and safe world order in the context of globalization under the rule of international law, the central coordinating role of the United Nations and its Security Council, Canada is one of those states that fairly consistently uphold these principles in the international arena.

Our approaches are also close throughout the entire range of issues of ensuring international peace and security, primarily in the field of countering terrorism and organized crime, preventing proliferation of WMD. To such problems that Canada decided to integrate into the agenda of bilateral relations with Russia, include the strengthening of the foundations of strategic stability, including the prevention of WMD proliferation; Reforming the UN system; Enhancing the safety of nuclear power plants; Interaction for the sustainable development of world energy; Cooperation in the settlement of regional conflicts; The fight against international terrorism, transnational organized crime, corruption and the laundering of illicit proceeds.

In addition, relations between our two countries have a significant field for their development in various fields and areas: from the economy to education. However, the dynamics of our relations will be determined by the willingness of Ottawa to conduct its foreign policy course more independent from Washington and, in general, from the West.
